The Parish Council was finally able to meet in the Pavilion, but the 'pingdemic' meant some were unable to attend. It was the first non-virtual meeting for our newest Parish councillor Debbie Parker, and for our Bookings and Facilities Assistant Wendy Jackson.

Many of our hirers and other events have restarted both in the Pavilion and on the recreation ground.

Our popular Pop in Café run by Sue Larken made a welcome return, and it was lovely to have the lunches up and running soon. We were so glad to see that Gillian Shepherd-Coates, who was the Chief Officer for Age UK Sevenoaks &

Talking of older residents, I'm sure most of you received a mail shot from McCarthy and Stone, outlining their proposals to build over 30 retirement flats on the site of the old Vauxhall garage. They are currently going though the planning process. The Parish Council will to campaign for sufficient parking on this site and appropriate sight lines at that difficult junction.

For our younger parishioners we are now working with partner organisations, and are providing Kent Panther Basketball sessions on Mondays, and tennis coaching on Thursdays. We've continued our programme of regular maintenance of our facilities, concentrating on the Village Green where the village sign and the noticeboard have been stripped back, repaired and repainted.

We also had the bus shelter fully refurbished but we were extremely disappointed



and angry that within a week of its completion, the bus shelter was damaged, not once, but twice with offensive graffiti and stickers. I wish this had been the only incident of antisocial behaviour since the end of lockdown but it wasn't. There have been several incidents of graffiti, broken glass and littering.

New litter bins have been installed on the shopping parade and we continue to fund regular emptying of our rubbish and dog bins throughout the village, however some people just leave



litter scattered for other to manage.

Two of our bins were also damaged. The one on Longford Meadow was ripped out of the ground, which took some doing as it was concreated in, and one on the recreation ground was kicked to bits. I realise that those responsible for such behaviour are unlikely to be reading this, but can I ask that if you see antisocial behaviour in the village please phone 101. Our local PCSOs have been very supportive and helpful in tracking down the culprits and when possible, action has been taken.



Have you seen our brand new noticeboard at the Rose and Crown end of London Road? The old one had got very shabby and was disappearing under the overgrown hedge!

We all need something to look forward to so we have booked our fireworks display and have fingers crossed that this will be able to go ahead on Saturday 25th September. It's free and it would be lovely so see as many of you as possible.

Donnington Hall is currently closed due to a new floor needing to be laid. When it re-opens (hopefully in September) activities will be as detailed in the list opposite.




Dunton Green Village Hall

They are FREE for participants! Please just turn up on a Monday to join the basketball; register your child for the mini tennis by texting Keir as per the poster.







- * The first face to face meeting of the Council took place in July after 16 months of virtual meetings.
- * Refurbishment works have been completed on the village green with the timber bus shelter, the noticeboard and village sign all getting some TLC. The wall at the Rose Garden has been repaired and the 'Eckersley' bench there has also had a makeover.




- * At time of print, we are still waiting for the installation of a barrier gate at the Lusted Road entrance to Longford Meadow. We hope that this will deter some of the ASB in that area by reducing access to the area by cars.
- * We have had a good deal of tree work completed over recent months emergency work to a fallen tree on our small open space in Mill Road; maintenance & management works within Price's Wood; and most recently dealing with trees in the recreation ground tackling Ash Dieback.
- New 'chat' benches will be installed around the village over the coming months providing more safe spaces for you to meet and chat with friends & neighbours.
- * We have been working with partners to reinstate and provide new services. Details of basketball, tennis and the Age UK sessions can be found in the newsletter. Please keep an eye on our website, Facebook page and noticeboards for updates.
- * The Annual Fireworks Display is now scheduled details on the back page.
- * We are planning for Remembrance Sunday and looking ahead towards, dare we say it, Christmas - watch this space!!
- * Climbing Rox Project Longford Meadow: Thank you to everyone who did submit feedback on the proposals outlined in the last edition. The overwhelming majority were very supportive of the proposals. We have taken onboard comments about the need for more litter bins and seating areas to really capitalise on the benefits of the project and these will be incorporated into the overall scheme. We will also review ongoing any need for lighting or CCTV in the area.
- * Price's Wood Bike Trail: we are looking at what can be done to encourage more use of the bike trail by families with younger children. We are also considering setting up a 'Friends of Price's Wood' group to help us ensure that the area is clear of litter, the trail is passable and to help inform of us of any works that might be needed. The Freighter cannot accept white goods, washing machines, dishwashers, fridges, freezers, cookers, cast iron boilers or baths, long metal poles, building materials, manure, large parts of engines or vehicles or hazardous waste.

Hazardous waste now includes items like fluorescent tubes, televisions & computer monitors, batteries, oil tins and filters, paint and paint tins and chemical containers. These items cannot be accepted on the Saturday Freighter service and must be taken to your nearest Household Waste Recycling Centre.

Compostable garden waste cannot be accepted.

Hopefully, you will recall from the Summer 2021 edition that we had been contacted by David Spicer about his grandad Alf's brother, Frederick Collison, who died in WW2 and is one of the fallen commemorated on the War Memorial.

Update from Dunton Green Primary School PTA



Throughout the recent summer term, it has been wonderful to witness the start of what we all hope can be a return to "normal" school life for our teachers and children. The staff at the school have worked tirelessly to enable more special celebrations and activities to take place as they would have previously, and this last term parents and carers have been able to attend sports days for each year group, open days to share children's learning progress, a Reception class "graduation" ceremony and of course a bittersweet farewell to our resilient Year 6s as they head off to secondary school.

However, like so many others, we continue to feel the lasting impact of the pandemic. The school has been educating the children of this community for over 100 years, but now more than ever, we are facing significant financial difficulties.

We are therefore delighted to introduce the "**Friends of Dunton Green School**" initiative. This is a local community and business partnership that we're setting up in direct response to the COVID-19 pandemic, which aims to do good in our village community, promote local businesses - but most of all will help to improve the education and prospects for the children of the village...

A higher-than-average proportion of our pupils are from disadvantaged backgrounds compared to other local schools (over 30% are eligible for Free School Meals, compared to the Kent average of 17.2%). Throughout Covid we have gone to significant lengths to support all pupils, but particularly our vulnerable children. We had approximately 25% of our students in school for the duration of lockdown which was much higher than the average for primary schools, alongside remote learning support for all pupils. In addition, due to the age and historical nature of our buildings, our classrooms and facilities urgently need modernising to make them safe and fit for purpose.

For example, in March this year our Breakfast & Afterschool Club

was confirmed as unusable by Kent County Council!

Many of our working parents rely heavily on this facility. It provides a safe space for children before and after school, and the building is regularly used by our vulnerable pupils to complete their homework.

Plus, it might surprise you to know that we have just 15 old, inefficient laptops to share between 180 pupils!

One of our Year 4 children says: "Lots of our laptops have black dots on the screen and are really slow. If we got new ones we would be able to see the whole screen and they would be faster".

Despite these challenges, our school is a happy school, and we've seen great improvements in recent years – both academically and regarding extra-curricular activities. We are now striving for our students to have the same opportunities as those attending other local primary schools.

Our Ofsted rating has rapidly gone from "Requires Improvement" to "Good". In June 2019, we were delighted that our pupils won the annual District Sports Inter-School Competition in the medium-sized school category, and in 2020 we were the overall Primary School Champions in the Kent Literacy Award.

By becoming a "Friend of Dunton Green School", you can help us to provide essential education and extra-curricular support for our children. There are multiple ways to get involved, and we have a number of exciting projects that are currently in development – including the urgent replacement of our breakfast and after-school club building, a new minibus, and the renovation of our Key Stage 2 playground. We would be extremely grateful for any financial support, expertise or advice villagers or companies could offer.

For example, do you or someone you know work for a company with objectives around supporting local communities, with a charity "pot" for local giving? Do you have any contacts in the building/landscaping industry that could advise us "pro bono", or offer discounts? Or do you own a shop or business in the village that we could promote to our school families in return for a regular gift? Or donate a new laptop or iPad so fewer children have to share during lessons?



In return, we would of course recognise and promote supporters wherever possible. We are also able to offer volunteering opportunities such as reading to pupils, or improving the school grounds through teambuilding days.

We are very happy to discuss ideas for support and would be delighted to personally show you around our lovely school. DGPC cannot understand why KCC continues to withhold in excess of £236,000, which was allocated for Education in the Ryewood development Section 106 Agreement. Berkeley Homes paid this money to KCC several years ago. The money was, incorrectly in the Parish Council's opinion, allocated for "provision of additional pupil places at primary schools within a two mile radius with priority consideration being given by KCC to the most local schools were appropriate". The Parish Council has asked repeatedly for details on when and where this money will be spent and to date has not had an adequate response to that. This funding could be put to good use NOW by DG primary school. The Parish Council argues that having fit for purpose buildings can only enhance the environment of the school, its ongoing successes and ensure that there is always a full roll from the village. The school should not be forced to close essential services when funds are withheld because KCC interprets the wording of the Agreement to mean only additional forms of entry (classes). DGPC continues to seek a

resolution that sees DGPS allocated the funding ASAP.


What you need to know about E-Scooters

Electrical scooters (also known as e-scooters) are been seen increasingly in our communities and have raised concerns about safety and the law So what are they....

E-Scooters come under the category of "powered transporters". This also covers a range of other personal transport devices which are powered by a motor. "Powered transporters" fall within the legal definition of a motor vehicle under the Road Traffic Act 1988. Therefore, the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to e-scooters. As a motor vehicle, they must comply with various pieces of Road Traffic Legislation, including but not limited to:

- · driving with a licence
- · driving/riding with insurance
- · driving/riding other than on a road need to be taxed

It is not currently possible to get appropriate



Legal use of an e-scooter

It is legal to use an e-scooter on private land with the permission of the land owner. In areas where a trial rental scheme is running, it is legal to use a rental e-scooter on a public road or cycle lane.

Enforcement

The most appropriate action for the circumstances will be given, these include:

- · a Fixed Penalty Notice for no insurance, with a £300 fine and six penalty points
- a Fixed Penalty Notice for no driving licence, up to £100 fine and three to six penalty points

Police will also take action against rider behaviour, whether private or rental. Offences could include:

- · riding on the footway: Fixed Penalty Notice and possible £50 fine
- using a mobile phone: £100 and six penalty points
- · riding through red lights: Fixed Penalty Notice, £100 fine and possible penalty points
- drink driving offences: As with driving cars; court imposed fines, driving ban and possible imprisonment
- If you are using an e-scooter in public in an anti-social manner, you can also risk the e-scooter being seized under section 59 of the Police Reform Act.

We would always recommend to wear safety protection such as a helmet when riding these vehicles, and to keep to the speed limit.





Keeping yourself and others safe: From 19 July

While many restrictions have been lifted, COVID-19 has not gone away so it's important we remain cautious.

By practising key behaviours we can continue to protect ourselves and others and help stop the virus spreading.

Bee Friendly!

Bees are big news at the moment, and rightly so, as we all know how vital they are for giving us the food we eat and the beauty of the flowers that we all enjoy. The world would be a very different place without bees and other pollinators and there are many initiatives going on, such as the recent Radio 2 Big Bee Challenge, to help increase bee numbers and provide the essential nectar, pollen and shelter which bees need to survive. There is such a wealth of information around which bee friendly plants we can plant to help the bees that it can be a bit overwhelming to decide which are good for our own green spaces, whether that be garden, patio or a window box.

Following on from my earlier attempts in Spring to identify the bees in my garden, I thought that for this edition, I would share with you the flowers that the bees seem to go for most in my own garden. I am lucky enough to have a small front garden, which is mainly gravel with a patch of earth, and have an equally small back garden, which is mainly paved with a small patch of scratchy grass. To increase the area for planting, I use lots of troughs and pots, and even my windowsills, to grow vegetables and flowers, including those specifically that I hope the bees will like.

To survive, bees need food, access to water so they don't dehydrate (but also don't drown, so put a stone, piece of wood/cork or something in the water so

they can crawl out!) and a place to shelter and nest (such as a bee hotel). Food for bees comes in the form of nectar, which provides sugar for energy and is used to make honey to feed their young brood, and pollen, which is a source of essential fats, proteins, vitamins and minerals. Over the years, I have tried to gather those plants which will help pollinators



all year round and have actively cultivated the plants that I see the bees like to visit most in my garden. Sometimes, and at some consternation for my long-suffering neighbours, this has led to the cultivation of some flowers which others may call 'weeds' and would happily pull up at the first sign!

So here is my take on what I see the bees like to visit most in my garden throughout the year:

In Spring and as we emerge from winter, the first Snowdrops and Crocuses appear in troughs which have been planted as bulbs the previous Autumn. These are great sources of nectar for any emerging bees if we have an early warm spell. This year I also grew Primroses; not the brightly coloured varieties which aren't useful for bees, but the smaller, subtle pale yellow native wild variety. This autumn, I am going to plant more Snowdrops, Crocuses and



Primroses in my patchy lawn ready to help the bees next Spring. Having shared in my previous article the surprise of seeing blue pollen sacs on honeybees, another important food source are Bluebells. I am hoping to purchase some **English bluebells** this autumn to replace the invasive Spanish bluebells which readily pop up in my garden and tend to flower later than the native variety.



Other nectar-rich spring flowering plants are the small, sweet smelling **Grape Hyacinths** which, together with the tiny piercing-blue flowers of **Green Alkanet** and Forget-me-

nots, provide a sea of blue in my front garden each year and are a buzz with bees. Be warned that, however pretty, Green Alkanet is a

bit of a thug and will readily self-seed everywhere in the most unexpected places. It's stem and leaves are covered in small hairs which are very irritating to human skin, as I have found out to my cost, so best wear gloves and long sleeves when pulling them up!

If you have a wall or fence in your garden, then a useful shrub for bees is a Cotoneaster. The mass of tiny bright red-pink flowers featured in my last article providing sustenance for a Tree bumblebee, and the flowers are a great favourite for all types of bees and the red berries a feast for blackbirds in the Autumn. Mauve Granny Bonnets and Honesty, a small Cranes-

bill Geranium with tiny pink flowers (possibly Herb Robert), and blue Love-in-the -mist, all self-sown in the gravel this year, flowered freely with Feverfew and



Wild Garlic, and all of them appeared to be great bee favourites. As the Green Alkanet fades and summer begins, the lilac flowers of **Comfrey**, a close cousin with equally itchy leaves, takes over the mantle and provides a fantastic food source for all types of bees. Another relation is Borage, which I have grown before and bees

love, but is equally invasive and very itchy!

As the Comfrey wanes, the lavender bush provides another very popular food source for bees, together with a later-flowering purple **Wild Geranium**, and self-sown Teasel and Wild Marjoram. Also self-sown in the gravel, the large soft, velvet, donkeyear leaves of Great Mullein has sprouted long spires of yellow flowers, which are currently attracting lots of bee attention.



In the back garden, the Passionflower, Sweet Peas, Honeysuckle, Clematis and Summer Jasmine are climbing across the fence enticing the bees to pollenate

my tomatoes, cucumbers, peas and peppers. I'm hoping that the Foxgloves planted this year will over-winter and flower next year along with the Ox-Eye Daisies and Hollyhocks. As I've been writing this, I have noticed that many of the flowers I have described that are attracting the bees the most have flowers that are coloured blue or purple.



Although at first this seemed unintentional, I now realise it is because I have actively sought and cultivated those flowers that I see bees like. I always purchase plants in Garden centres that are surrounded by bees. Therefore,



instead of showy multi-coloured Pelargoniums, Begonias, Pansies and Petunias, I come away with the blue/purple flowered Marjoram, Thyme, Chives, Alliums and Violets. It is not without co-incidence that many of the flowers I cultivate are blue or purple, as I have discovered that bees are attracted most to flowers that are in the violet-blue spectrum because they produce the highest volumes of nectar.

Simple, open flowers are also better for bees than the showier double types, and scent also attracts bees, so those plants high in essential oils are tops, which is why herbs, lavender and violets are so popular with bees.

So, as we go forward to full Summer and Autumn, I am hoping that the plants in my garden will keep the bees going. I will allow the ivy to flower as that is the last great source of nectar for bees, continue to keep the dandelions (sorry neighbours!) and even tolerate the occasional flowering Ground elder (but definitely pull it up before the seeds set!) and just hope that the Winter Jasmine comes good this year!

ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

In our last edition we showed you photos of Rye Lane before the construction of Ryewood began. In this instalment, we look at what happened in 2012:





The vets surgery (which is now in the old St Johns church) was demolished at the corner of Station Road and London Road, to enable construction of the mini roundabout. The first Berkeley Homes hoardings appeared in the village.



The first homes in Campion Square began to emerge.

The showroom and landscaping were completed at the front of the site by July.



PUBLIC ACCESS DEFIBRILLATORS

In Dunton Green the Parish Council has (to date) funded the provision of FOUR Public Access Defibrillators (PADs). The Parish Council maintains these with the assistance of the Sevenoaks Community First Responders, who keep a check on them and make sure that we know when batteries and pads need replacing. The defibrillators are also registered with Southeast Coast Ambulance Service, so if you are a 999 caller they can direct you, if needed, to the nearest defibrillator.

All these defibrillators are located outside and are in unlocked heated cabinets which are easily publicly accessible (24/7). They are placed in the following locations:

- Dunton Green Pavilion, Recreation Ground. The defib cabinet is on the wall of the Pavilion, opposite the tennis court.
- Dunton Green Village Hall, London Road (next to the War Memorial). The defib cabinet is located on the front wall of the hall.
- The Bed Shop, Broadway Parade, London Road. The defib cabinet is located on the outside wall of The Bed Shop (next to Bojangles).
- The Gym, Campion Square, Ryewood. The defib cabinet is located on an outside wall (facing Rye Lane).

Myths dispelled!

YOU MIGHT HURT SOMEONE WHEN USING THE DEFIB. You CANNOT cause someone harm by using a defibrillator. These remarkable pieces of kit know whether someone needs defibrillation. If they do, the machine will discharge a current. If they do not need defibrillating, the defib will not shock them.

YOU NEED TRAINING TO USE ONE. No, these machines will guide you through what you need to do. There are instructions on the pads regarding placement of them and there is a voice that will guide you through what needs doing. Understandably, you may be nervous about using the defibrillator, but it is better to try than not. If you can, use basic CPR techniques until you can use the defibrillator.

The Parish Council has provided free defibrillator and CPR training sessions previously and will look to do this again, in conjunction with Sevenoaks Community First Responders. We will advertise when this been organised - look out for details on our social media and noticeboards.

We hope that you never need to these PADs, but they are provided by Dunton Green Parish Council for the health & safety of the community. Thank you to the Sevenoaks CFR team for their continued support and assistance.
